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From "Good" to "Great" Questions

The first time I handed Graham a draft of training questions, he smiled broadly. Initially, I thought that he was pleased with my work. I would soon realize it was probably because he knew I was about to have an encounter with better questions.

There were several of mine that were useable but I marveled as he kindly walked me through the process of "good" questions becoming "great" ones.

Graham's questions caused me to think for myself. They targeted a process, not a single answer. One question had the ability to lead to another. Even our editing process consisted of questions, as he posed queries that helped me connect my previous learning to this new upgrade.

It sparked a whole new path of development for me: questions about questions. What *were* great questions comprised of? What kinds of questions did Jesus ask? What questions was I currently asking God, my friends and TWC? And were there more powerful questions?

We are passionate about developing self-starting, Kingdom thinkers who resonate with the heart of God and the Mind of Christ. We want our questions to provoke process and create joy in exploring the possibilities.

In Longmont, Graham spent 2 hours answering questions that you asked. It will take months to unwrap the mountains of treasure his answers deposited. But one immediate reward? When he paused half way through and commented, "These are good questions!"

It's a start.

These three question are ones that I have found highly effective, for transition, for leadership teams or for times of significant upgrade:

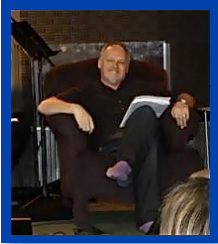
Who am I?: Look at your Identity Statement & prophetic words. Which identity applies or is a new one emerging?

What am I?: The role, job or way in which my identity will manifest in this.

Where am I?: Have I outgrown my present job or role? Is a geographic relocation needed? Am I in the same locale, but in a different place or in a different way?

Enter into a dialogue with the Holy Spirit. Take notes of answers as they unfold.

In The Warrior Class, we're still defining the intel process. I like where we are now. I think it's good and we are developing excellent skills. But I also think we're on our way to something spectacular. On that journey, we're growing in the ability to listen, process, refine and shift atmospheres with what we discover. Better yet, you're developing these same skills in your personal walk with God through your growing relationship with Him, so that when we come to corporate events, it's not a big deal to go to the next level.

Good questions bring focus & refining

We're all learning focus and how to ask questions of the Lord. It used to be that people would hear something and then write it down as "intel".

The first thing you hear is not for me, it's for you. It should cause you to ask questions: "What does this mean?", "What's God opening up?", "How does He want to do this?"

It's the same with the prophetic. The first thing we get should always prompt more questions. It goes back to the story about the man who bounded up and said, "I've got a word from the Lord for you!" He was very intense, laid hands on me, prayed in tongues for five minutes and then finally said, "You are a ship leaving harbor." That was it. I was so annoyed I could have spit feathers! I immediately had a hundred questions! What kind of ship is it? Is it a row boat? A skiff? An aircraft carrier? Does it have weapons? food? How many people are on it? Where are they going? His version of this word didn't help me at all.

When he first heard I was like a ship leaving harbor, *he* should have been the one to start asking questions. The first thing you get is where YOU enter into a dialogue with the Lord. If you give me the first picture or scripture you get as intel, then we're going to have to sort through it and figure out what God is really saying.

It's why it's in your lifestyles too. You're learning to ask God really good questions about your life & circumstances. So when you come to get intel for an assignment, you've been practicing.

We're learning to ask Him:

"What are the questions that I need to ask You that opens up a dialogue for me with You so we can explore this?" And, "How do I distill that into 2-3 sentences?"

It's interesting when you look at any army, their communications and military intelligence. That is exactly what they do. They take loads of intel and start asking questions. They refine it and refine it, so that when they came to stand before Churchill, they haven't got a book as big as "War & Peace", but a couple of paragraphs with 2-3 key sentences. That's what they'll make their decisions from for D-Day. We're moving into this more succinct, foxhole type input that enables me to be focused and go after one thing. And if I go after one thing, I'm likely to hit a few more important things as well.

Intel gives focus

Intel helps me to have legitimate focus and go after the things I *should* be going after, rather than the things the enemy wants me to go after.

In warfare, the enemy wants you to fight on his terms. So he will make noise, create diversions and try to get you off of the one thing that matters. Intel is designed to help me focus on the one thing that matters. So that's what we're learning to develop: What's the real fight here and what's the fight the enemy wants us to have that we're going to ignore?

Refining Intel for outcomes

When I write a talk, I do this type of refining. I sit down and think:

What is the outcome that I want to achieve from this talk?

What is the proclamation or impartation that God wants to release?

What is the anointing and the breakthrough that God wants to give?

That's where I start. Then I work back to the opening sentence. My opening sentence is usually about the outcome. Once I know the outcome, my next dialogue with the Lord is about the obstacles that will prevent people from having that outcome. He tells me the problems people will have, so my talk becomes about how to overcome them.

In the intel, that's what we're thinking about: How to process everything to an outcome.

What is the outcome God wants people to receive?

What are the obstacles? and What will God displace them with?

I used to ask leaders what they wanted to achieve, but in the end, it just became more risky than anything else. Some leaders would be right on the money, knowing accurately where they were and what the Lord wanted to do. But some would just give you their wish list and want you to sort it out. Still others would come in with something completely unrealistic, like "We want the glory of God and angelic visitations". Well, good luck with that! They want to have this breakthrough, but they don't have the leadership to sustain it. I've learned to step back from asking them what they want to achieve. I still do it sometimes, but I know the risk. What we're doing in TWC is that we've become the ones asking these questions of the Holy Spirit!

Shifting Atmospheres

The devil is the prince of the power of the air. He lives in the atmosphere. He wants to create the atmosphere we live in with lies. That's why a big part of our warfare is to ignore what he is doing, because he's a liar and the father of lies. He wants you in delusion, deception or despondency. Jesus said, "The prince of this world has come, but he has nothing on me." Jesus came to change the atmosphere.

The atmosphere for any assignment can be negative or positive. If it's negative, it could be from a poverty mindset: "This is the most economically deprived city in America" (I've been to about a hundred of those so far). Or it could be a church that's had a split five years ago and is still suffering. There are hurts, wounds or issues in relationships that have never been resolved... and the atmosphere is thick with all of them.

One of the biggest issues I encounter in the evangelical community (speaking as an evangelical), is that we are a problem-seeking people. Everything is seen as a problem to be fixed. But... there are no problems in heaven, only possibilities.

When you see something as a possibility, you ask different questions.

The questions you ask from seeing life in terms of problems don't really solve anything, they just make you more despondent. A problem-seeking community has an atmosphere that is entirely negative. Everything is about their effort and all the things that have to be done (sigh). In that type of atmosphere, most people don't want the true prophetic, they want magic. And most people *definitely* don't want process, they want an impartation that magically delivers them into a different place. God doesn't do magic.

Of course, it's the process that makes you rich! So shifting from a problem mindset to a possibility mindset is a huge and very necessary shift that often needs to be made.

When we are coming into an event, TWC needs to ask "What's the prevailing atmosphere here?" because we need to move in the opposite spirit to that. Sometimes you can tell what God wants to do by what the enemy has presented. Let's use that. God is the opposite spirit, as we know in Isaiah 61. We need to take authority over the negative, so that we can release the opposite instead.

This is where my partnership is. I don't feel it's my job to shift the negative. That's the job of The Warrior Class. My job is to create the environment for what is deposited and for what we leave behind after I'm gone.

Whatever we discern about the works of the enemy, we must destroy, because Jesus came to destroy the works of the devil. Whatever negatives we discern, we get to destroy in the opposite spirit. I hope you have fun doing that! Whatever we discern about the works of God, we get to create. There's a destructive and a creative process in warfare. I get to create something on the back of what you've destroyed. That's pretty cool. ~ *Graham*

1. Once you have an ID statement, review it every few months.

Your initial statement is not an ending, but a beginning.

Continue to look at your Inheritance Words and Prophetic words again for clues you may have missed before.

Example: I had an older prophetic word that I thought I recalled clearly. What I remembered was the part that was very relevant to my life at the time. There were other key phrases that I had missed.

2. How much is reality? How much is future?

If all your statements belong in a fantasy novel, time to revise! If you are living in the fullness of every identity description, then time to look forward!

*We are a **present - future** people.
Both the future AND the present
should be represented.*

Example: You can devise a simple scale to evaluate your statement. You may wish to put a + or - next to each statement.

Maybe a 1-3 scale is helpful:
1 = clearly evident
2 = becoming evident
3 = not yet evident.

Create something that works for you.

This will also help you take current statements to the next level.

Example: I recently upgraded my statement about writing: from "I am a writer of words that bring freedom from religious slavery", to "I am an *author*...". I am consistently writing now, so my next piece of the future is for my writing to contribute to my income!

3. Upgrade your language

Are there **old religious phrases** that don't reflect the Kingdom?

Example: "I am saved, sealed and sanctified". Pretty churchy.
How about: "I live in the reality of grace, a son of God that pleases Him."

Are there **vague terms** that could be more specific?

Example: "I am a discoverer."
Of what? Where do you explore?
What do you find?

One of my statements is: "I am a discoverer of lost inheritances. I open forgotten treasures that unlock future destinies".

It is specific to what I discover, what kind of treasures I open and what the outcome is for people.

4. Sort beyond the obvious.

Example:
In Longmont, I used several examples that all seemed to address the identity of a warrior. But upon closer review, several were not and others pertained to a more specific type of fighter.

True Warrior ID words:

- "Healthy, strong & confident: I run to the fight"

- "Made to abide in the clash between two Kingdoms"

Words more specific than "warrior":

- "Willing to commit yourself and others to a winnable fight".

That's more the persona of a General

Military imagery, but not about a warrior:

- "My mouth is a sharp sword": this is actually about my prophetic & teaching persona.

- "I wear the Centurion's armor":
It's about *whose* armor. The Centurion's majestic perspective & faith is the identity key. Faith & majesty provide protection.

(BTW: not all of these appear in my ID Statement, but contributed to it.)

4. Distilling

I like the word "distilling" because while reduction is occurring, the potency is increasing.

Example: My first statement about endurance & acceleration was an entire paragraph: "I am a long distance runner, focused and tenacious. I am committed to going the distance and can run any course I am given. Like Secretariat, I love the race and am a combination of speed and endurance. I am happiest running at full speed. I am climber of high places, thriving in a high altitude life."

There's no way I could remember that under pressure!! Here's the current form.

"Built for speed, endurance and altitude, I can run any course, any time, under any circumstances."

5. Impact : How does your identity impact others?

I first began to see this in Graham's Identity statement:

As one of his three points under:
"A lover of God and the Secret Place",
Graham includes -
"Encouraging Renewal and Reformation in people's lives".

Under "A Warrior who relishes the fight" is:
"Developing and Empowering a new breed of Warrior".

Example: My statement about speed, endurance and altitude now includes:
"Empowering & encouraging others to run faster, dig deeper and climb higher".

What impact do you want your identity to have on people and cultures?

Everything we do in The Warrior Class is meant to be expanded & established. Your identity & your statement should continue to develop .

What's your next identity upgrade?

One word that I would use to describe how my ID statement has helped my development process is 'catalyst'.

It has opened up life within me and it draws from a bottomless deep well that was established before the foundations of the world. It is me, beholding and becoming.

Questions for Exploration ~ Allison Bown

Graham is a master at questions for exploration. Consider some of his classics:

"What would you attempt for God if you had no fear?"

"What is this person not seeing about themselves that would make them behave like that?"

"When you consider the beauty of His nature and goodness, what provisions can you imagine?"

"Who does God want to be to me now that He couldn't be at any other time?"

"What will it take for you to believe that God is unceasingly magnificent towards you?"

I had many great passions during my 20 years as an educator, but one of the strongest was redefining the use of questions in the classroom. Even though I taught the youngest students, many already had a fear of failing to have the right answer.

For many of us, being asked a question in school meant you were supposed to know something *and* be able to share what you knew. Even if you were right, there would probably be something you forgot. And if, by some miracle, you had all the information and the words to communicate it, someone else might be called upon and no one would ever hear what you knew. It was a minefield for failure.

So during the first months of school, I rarely asked questions for information (except for important stuff like: "Are you going to throw up?"). Otherwise, I focused on questions that prompted further exploration. I gave every student an opportunity to respond, either to me, a friend or a stuffed animal (they make *great* non-judgmental listeners!). Answers didn't have to be with words. They could be drawn in pictures or acted out and we would guess the answer, like Charades. If spoken, it could be whispered or even sung! Creativity in both content and expression was encouraged.

It was my personal war on a mindset that I had seen destroy the love of learning and replace it with performance and fear. And it's a fight I continue to love in my life of training warriors on the field of intercession.

Education presented questions to find if we knew the information. Religion told us what to think, but not to think too much about it. Study it. Know it. But don't ask "why" or "how" and *never* ask "what if".

The Kingdom asks us to explore.

Jesus often used parables to teach, but He only interpreted them a few times. He gave His team a few examples of the process, but *He wanted them to gain understanding through their own relationship with the Father & the Spirit - just as He had*. It was okay with Him if they struggled a bit in that process. If they didn't get it initially, He trusted the Holy Spirit to eventually teach them, remind them and comfort them on the days it was all a muddle.

In Longmont, I did a session on taking our Identity Statements to the next level... but in actuality, it was an opportunity to break down the obstacle of needing to have the "right" answer in our TWC culture. The identity teaching just happened to be a great vehicle to do it in. During the opening 10 minutes, permission was given to use questions for exploration & the next hour was spent practicing. Sneaky, huh?

Because the mindset is so imbedded, a little sneakiness is required at times, but now that the secret is out, consider these thoughts as you continue to grow in your Warrior Class training. Lose the baggage of "questions for information" and pick up the luggage of "questions for exploration". Permission is much lighter to carry than performance.

**Good questions build connections.**

Our revelation doesn't come just from the words we hear, but from the *connections* the Holy Spirit makes to our experiences with God, our learning and to our truest identity.

When we make the connections instead of teachers making them for us, the impact becomes personal and lasting.

In the Kingdom, powerful questions should pull out of you what has already been deposited (which is usually more than you realize) and create a space for you to connect to a new mindset or fresh revelation.

Exploratory questions that make us think for ourselves are essential to true transformation.

Questions of exploration lead to encounters. Encounters lead to mindset transformations. When mindsets are transformed, a Kingdom lifestyle emerges.

If we really believe that it's the process that makes us rich, then exploring with questions that make us think for ourselves becomes essential. Otherwise, we end up regurgitating the ideas of others without having a personal encounter with the Truth.

Graham may open up amazing truth about the Kingdom, but the real question is, **"How true is it for you?"**

It's why our Evidences of Transformation are so critical. They demonstrate your personal process, not just knowledge.

Questions in a mentoring or training context should release a process of sorting and understanding.

Is what you believe actually true?

If not, what encounter with Truth awaits you?

If it is truth, is there further refining or upgrading needed?

Or is a great mindset and a solid foundation? Intentionally ponder with Him why that's true. And then think of your next question for Him about this area of exploration.

Questions are for building relationship with God, not just for acquiring knowledge.

We aren't asking questions just to know more, but like Paul, it is the knowledge of Jesus we desire most.

*"to **know** Christ Jesus my Lord and progressively become more deeply and intimately acquainted with Him" - Phil. 3:8 Amp.*

As we ask & keep on asking, we have the opportunity to grow in dependency & sensitivity with the One who adores us. Our questions should never be just for knowledge acquisition, but to better know more of who God really is.

In all this talk of exploration, hear me clearly: there *is* absolute Truth. His name is Jesus and there is definitely unchangeable, immovable Truth in His nature. But the glory of our creative God is that there are many different styles, experiences and ways of communicating it to us. Jesus used parables, miracles, sermons and relational experiences to express the Kingdom. Our desire is simply to embrace the same creativity He demonstrated.

As a community, we are gaining confidence in sharing ideas, not what we perceive to be "right" answers. It is taking territory in one of the most frequent obstacles many Warrior have expressed: the feeling that everyone else is "getting it" except me. **It's a lie...** and one of the few defenses our adversary can come up with.

We are brilliant warriors in a brilliant Kingdom community, growing up into a brilliant relationship with God and each other. Our enemy simply must invent something to keep us from believing that's true. It's so obvious that he can't deny the existence of who we are, but he can try to convince you that you're not one of the brilliant ones.

As Graham says, "You're more brilliant than you think you are, more beautiful than you know." **You are, because Jesus is in you and you are in Him.** *That's the real answer to all the questions anyway* - and we are both encountering it for ourselves and being transformed into the image of God because of it.

What are some of your Exploratory Questions?

Use a journal or notebook to record your questions. Create a different section for each question and continue to collect your revelations, insights, scriptures and Holy Spirit connections. Every few months, write a "blog" or short summary piece on what you've discovered so far. The act of writing often sparks new insight. Each piece becomes a stair step to the next level of exploration.

Evidences of Transformation

PERCEPTION - How we see the world around us

I am being challenged more by goodness and am seeing beyond circumstances that would have previously created stress.

Example/Evidence:

I have been looking at the stress, challenges and financial provision of my job as an opportunity for growth, learning and experiences that I could not get in any other setting. My mindset is learn what needs to be learned in these situations because in the future they will be places of victory, (rocks from the river Jordan) that I can look back on and then move forward in confidence. ~ Kelly Megonigle

LANGUAGE - How we talk about ourselves, God and others

I am talking more about who I am in Christ instead of all I am not

Example/Evidence: I was not used to praying aloud or being with people who were gifted and I would say to myself, "What are you doing here? You just don't measure up."

In this last year, I see that we all have something to offer one another, and I now say, "I can do this. I just need practice". ~ Sharon Stahnke

FAITH - Evidence of moving from believing to knowing

I am more willing to take risks with less fear of failure

Example:

I have taken the idea that God isn't afraid of my failures literally. This has given me freedom to step out. Family is often the most difficult place for me to express my faith that God is working in our behalf and that He is able to intervene in every day events.

Evidence:

I have intentionally expressed my faith in God working things out for our good at the dinner table, even though some of my family is pessimistic. I have found attitudes softening towards me, the situation and believing that God is good. Although the situation has not changed, I am renewed in joy each morning and able to love and shoulder the extra work without feeling burdened!. ~ Marcia Reinhart

The Walk of Questions ~ Rita Reidenauer

During our recent Worship Ebb, the Holy Spirit continued my education on the value of asking questions. During one of the training sessions in

Longmont, Allison spoke to us about the use of questions in understanding and developing "truth which lead to encounters and encounters which lead to transformation". She also said, **"Questions are tools to prompt deeper thinking"**.

In my many years as a Christian, I have learned to recognize, depend upon and obey the voice of the Lord. I have known the wisdom of responding to His voice with a quick "Yes" upon my lips. But, there was a whole new world waiting for me to explore beyond my first response. It was the world of deeper thinking, which results in a greater understanding of His ways, through the path of asking questions!

What I have always done instinctively, I am now beginning to explore more deeply, in order to bring about a greater depth of understanding of His ways in my life.

I am familiar with answering questions that are presented to me by others in the process of study and training. But this is a life-style upgrade of using questions in my private devotional time. As I am stepping into my new question relationship with Him, I sense His excitement in being with me here. I guess it's true that we are never too old to learn a new way of entering into the heart of God.

My introduction to using questions in order to go deeper with God began several months ago when Graham asked why had I responded in a certain way to the prompting of the Holy Spirit at a conference we were attending. My reply to him was, **"Because Holy Spirit said to and I – just did it."** Then Graham asked, "But *why* do you think He told you to do that?"... Dang!!! I had

never before asked Holy Spirit for **more!** I had always just done as He said and left it at that.

This little exchange opened up a new place for me to explore and learn from my Teacher. It caused me, for the first time in my personal development, to ask for understanding of my obedience to His voice. As He gave me His explanations, I could feel my comprehension of His ways growing.

He was giving me encouragement to ask more of Him for the purpose of showing me great and mighty things I knew not of.

I used my new questions again after writing my article for the August Frontline. I realized that Holy Spirit had more revelation to show me concerning the meaning behind my dance at the end of our TWC Conference. He was continuing my education. The Spirit understands me like no one else does & He teaches me like no one else can. Therefore, when I am in His classroom, my spiritual IQ goes way up!

Jimetta Mayne had said to me earlier in our TWC Gathering, "I see you dancing on the enemy's head – WITH STILETTOS!" Great word, but I didn't revisit it until Holy Spirit recently brought the experience back to my remembrance. He kept showing me Jimetta's face and telling me her words. I could sense Him saying, "Ask Me! Come on ask Me! Ask Me more about that word! Practice using your questions!" So I did.

"I see you dancing on the enemy's head", was the first part of the word. We had the victory over our enemy as I was doing a victory dance. I could have said "Amen" & have been very happy. But if I had chosen to stop there and be satisfied with this explanation, I would have missed a great deal of God's message. So I put on my swamp boots and went digging deeper for more understanding on the "with Stilettos" part of the word.

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Stilettos! - That is where I needed questions. What was the significance of those stilettos and why was He so specific in naming the particular type of shoe?

I found that Stiletto means **dagger!** Now I had another part of the understanding of Jimetta's word as it related to my dance. But my questioning continued. I went yet again to Holy Spirit and asked, "Are these specific kinds of daggers?" I learned that they were.

He responded to me with a question of His own: "What did you sense as you danced?" My answer was: "Your Great Love toward the warriors of TWC". I was filled with rejoicing and laughter in knowing that God was giving out the weapons in the words of our closing song, "I Bless You". He said, "Those are the daggers you held when you danced on the enemy's head and what TWC uses in being victorious over the enemy". From the song they are listed as:

Joy, Peace, Love, Grace, Faith, Courage, the ability to endure. Basically, the Fruit of the Spirit were our daggers of victory!

I could feel myself giving birth to yet another question, as I continued with Him. This was becoming great fun.

In our Q&A time, Graham said, "**Overcoming is a norm. TWC is moving into a place of being more than a conqueror**". Did Jimetta's word describe the victory dance as the demonstration of TWC celebration of moving from overcomers to being more than conquerors?

I heard the definition of being more than a conqueror given by Graham, but I only heard it with my head. *It wasn't until I stayed in the question with Holy Spirit that I heard the definition with my heart and it became a part of who I am determined to become in this next season and what I see TWC becoming.*

Do you have a favorite Scripture or a prophetic word that you have read or heard and have not gone deeper to see what He has for you there?

Start questioning Him.

Ask and keep on asking.

Keep growing in the knowledge of Him who is faithful to teach you all things.

Record what you discover.

Remember: The Holy Spirit loves the questions!

Growing in Our Prophetic Intel

Your first impression with Prophetic Intel is often the "x" that marks the spot. Dig and refine.

Ask questions of the Spirit.

1. "What" and "how": Terms like "Mindset shift", "upgrade" & "breakthrough" are too general.

What is the specific mindset, upgrade or breakthrough and **what** does God do that causes it to occur?

2. Learn to identify & expand outcomes. Outcomes are great starting points, but HOW will God accomplish them?

Example: "Joy" is an outcome.
"These things I have spoken to you that My joy might be in you and your joy might be full" John 15:11 **Joy was an outcome of what Jesus had said to them.**

Have you listed an outcome as a deposit that Graham is making? If you have, now ask:

How will God do it?

What is the **specific revelation of God's nature** that brings that outcome?

Other examples of outcomes:

peace, confidence, faith, strength, courage, patience, endurance, passion....

3. Be specific with the attributes of God's nature that Graham is depositing.

Example: "Graham will deposit "God's love." Great, but God "loves" in many ways. Is there more?

Is it the First Love of being between the Father and Jesus, held in place by the Spirit?

Is it the revelation of being a much-loved child?

Is it love for a mature son?
Jesus for His bride/church?



As you know, we are continually upgrading and exploring in The Warrior Class with what we learn on the journey. Graham is discovering the keys that unlock each assignment & these are now reflected in our new intel questions.



- 1. What are the key obstacles or challenges for this community?**
What is the prevailing atmosphere Graham is walking into? *This tells us the atmosphere we will be shifting through intercession prior to Graham's arrival. It allows us to turn the enemy's plans to our advantage. That's majesty focused vengeance!*
- 2. What is God's key opposite that displaces it? What is He doing "instead"?**
In one sentence, what does God want to do that shifts this atmosphere before Graham arrives?
- 3. What are Graham's key deposits for this community, region or group?**
List one or two primary truths that Graham is on assignment to deposit.
- 4. What is God giving back to Graham from these deposits and impartations?**

Optional Questions

Any key Scriptures for this assignment?

Any visions, dreams or specific prophetic impressions?

If so, describe the vision/dream/impression in 2-3 sentences.

Include your interpretation. What does it mean for Graham or this community?

What are Graham's key impartations?
